Digital Collections Hosting

• LM Digital Hosting

- Free hosting of access files via LM's CONTENTdm
- No paywall or login required for access
- Flexible (contribute a lot or a little)
- All formats accepted **except** newspaper
- Minimum metadata requirements
- o Partner retains ownership
- Direct pipeline to sharing via DPLA
- Preservation storage is **not** included





Grant Funding

Improving Access to Information Grant

- Ideal for projects that engage local communities in the collection, documentation, and preservation of their local histories, experiences, and identities
- Can be used for in-house and/or vendored digitization services
- Open to eligible public and academic libraries
- Must share metadata with DPLA
- Award range \$5,000-25,000

Digital Michigan Newspaper Grant

- Scanning and placing online of a previously microfilmed newspaper
- Microfilming, scanning, and placing online of a straight run of a newspaper
- Digital hosting on the Clarke Historical Library's Michigan Digital Newspapers Database
- Call for applications in January



DPLA (https://dp.la/)

- Founded in 2013
- Provides an alternative to commercial search engines for teachers, students, and the general public
- All search results are records from curated collections hosted by libraries, archives, museums, historical societies
- Shares only metadata
- A "Hub Network"
 - Content Hubs (Smithsonian, New York Public Library, Hathitrust, etc.)
 - Service Hubs (mediators between DPLA and small and medium institutions in each state)

Michigan Memories

- First version launched in 2018
- New version launched on February 28, 2025 with a complete redesign
- Hosted at Western Michigan University
- Like the DPLA, shares only metadata
- Places collections in a statewide, Michigan-centric context
- Over 800,000 records and counting





Timber Tales: Lumbering and lumber camps

We often think of Michigan as a manufacturing powerhouse, but before that it was a major source for the raw materials that nineteenth-century America needed most: copper, iron, salt, and especially lumber.

Pine trees, especially white pine, were the most valuable because they were the best for making furniture, being relatively lightweight and easy to work. Early surveyors estimated there could be 150 billion feet of pine wood in Michigan, but the final number turned out to be much higher.

Most of the wood harvested in the United States during the early nineteenth century came from forests along the East Coast, especially in Maine. But by the 1840s, lumber companies were looking for new sources of wood, and many of them moved their operations to Saginaw Bay. Rivers flowing into the bay gave the logging companies access to hundreds of miles of forest, and Saginaw became a major center for lumber by the 1850s. On the western side of the state, Muskegon became an even larger hub, and as Willis Dunbar notes, "second only to Chicago among Lake Michigan ports" (p 340).
